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# **My First Regional Forum**

I had the good fortune to attend my first Regional Forum last weekend. I've been sober in AA for 37 years so the good news is, you can stay sober not attending a forum, and not even knowing what one is! But if you are curious, as I was, read

held September 16-18, 2022, in Salt Lake City, included workshops with titles like "Building the Informed Group Conscience," "Service Sponsorship" and "Overcoming Local Apathy." I was not able to attend the workshops since I am taking another college course and had pressing homework. Neither did I attend the Delegate Presentations or the First-Timer's Orientation.

I did attend a Saturday afternoon presentation by Trish L, Trustee at Large from Canada, on the topic of "A.A. Around the World." I learned of the existence of REDELA, an organization uniting AA meetings throughout Latin America. # **Not My First Regional Forum**

Approximately 570 A.A. members -- exceeding the planned-for attendance of 300 -- showed up in force for the Pacific Regional Forum in Salt Lake City, Utah from September 16 - 18, 2022. A large of array of trusted A.A. servants from the San Diego -Imperial Area were in attendance. There was also a very robust presence of Spanishspeaking members from all over the Region, including some who travelled from

Mexico to attend this inspiring event.

Interspersed throughout the weekend were "What's on Your Mind?" sessions, during which A.A. members asked questions and made suggestions to trustees of the General Service Board, A.A. World Services Board, and A.A. Grapevine Board, along with General Service Office/ Grapevine/La Vina staff members. The presentations included such varied topics as

the role of Class A and Class B trustees, General Service Office, delegate presentations on a wide range of topics, a financial report by the Treasurer of the General Service Board, workshops on matters of current interest in A.A., a session on "Who's Not In The Rooms?" as well as the boards of A.A. I particularly enjoyed attending the sharing session from our Past Trustees, both Class A and Class B "alcoholic" Trustees. I was moved by their sharing and observations about our fellowship, often from perspectives that I had never considered. These are the folks at the bottom of our upsidedown triangle. In AA, the groups are at the top. The groups not only hold the power of the purse, but also, through an informed group conscience, pass on through a group's General Service Representative (that is the position I hold at my home group, the Carlsbad AA Workshop) how the groups would vote on issues that eventually make it down to the Area Delegate. The Delegate, through attending the General Service Conference in

New York, makes proposals to the General Service Board which, in part, consists of these Trustee people. Here's a link to a video on our General Service Office: https:// m.youtube.com/watch? v=P4mnDvinzzY I learned that the percentage of total contributions to the General Service Office has decreased for groups and increased for individual members. Currently, individual members provide about 30% of the annual funds to GSO. The percentage of group contributions has been declining for years. This

is interesting because our service structure only provides for participation by the individual through the groups and their elected General Service Representative. While individual contributions are increasing, individual AA members do not have a voice with General Service unless they belong to an AA Group

In closing, I would like to share my number one reason our General Service Structure is important. It allows all of us to travel across the United States and the world, and to find an AA Meeting that we find familiar. Local customs may differ, but the Steps, Traditions, and Concepts are the same. The General Service Structure makes this possible. Regional Forums are a wonderful way to learn more about General Service and anyone may attend, plus there is no registration fee for attendees. This is the point where we ask ourselves, how important is our Big Book? Will it benefit just those who are here today, or future generations to come? Each of you have a story and the deadlines are approaching. Do you want to miss an opportunity for sharing your experience, strength and hope with thousands of people around the world? Just imagine being a part of someone's solution. All it takes is

some motivation from within to make the time, sit down and write how it was, how it has been and how it is today. I might even encourage another member from my home group or even a sponsee to share their story.

Have we shared this opportunity with enough AA members from our fellowship to get a good cross section of all the members? I am still wondering if the Big Book has even helped some members in their recovery or not. Is it possible that some newcomers do not stay here because they are not comprehending the message written in the book? Could our book have some translation errors that may need to be corrected for a better understanding? Are the words of the founders accessible to everyone?

Some members of the Spanish community have shared that they hardly ever read the book and years have passed and they are still in the program, still sober. Others are currently in Big Book study groups and are understanding it very well, enriching their lives with the recovery program that has saved their life, your life, my life and many others' lives, and the ones to come.

I want to share that during an isolation period in the Pandemic months, I contracted the Covid sickness. Confined to my house, I sat down one day, opened the book and just started to read. When my eyes got tired of reading, I listened to my audio book and followed along during each chapter, even reading the stories. While reading the book, I understood the words far better

than while listening, though there were some clarities during the listening of which I found much value.

Please, relay the message from our General Service Office to our fellow members, both Spanish and English speaking, to author their stories and submit them to help

carry the message of experience, strength and hope to all who need our program. There are a variety of topics that can be included in those stories, such as ethnic diversity, cultural diversity, gender diversity, social class, your experience of recovery during the pandemic, newcomer experiences, the valuable experiences of our old timers, accessibility experiences, spiritual experiences, your experiences with

virtual platforms, as well as sobriety and mental health experiences. Just pause and think whether it is possible to save a still suffering alcoholic's life with just a few hours of your time with a pen and paper, your computer, laptop or even your portable smart phone device. I will be sending my story before the deadlines, either October 31st or December 15<sup>th</sup> or both!

Our Big Book has been a blessing for my recovery and hopefully for yours. Let us pass this on to our future generations with the most current phases of the lives we are living today. We are miracles. Richard Ortega, Alt. Delegate, Panel 72

Now that severe COVID restrictions are lifted, there are A.A. meetings there each Saturday which could really use H&I panel members. There are evening meetings there as well which could use our help.

Now, why I love Imperial County. The editor may well delete this as it is not pertinent to the Assembly, but there is much to like in the IC. It is small town America at its best. I already mentioned the Roundup,

but the Brawley Cattle Call each November closes down the town – literally. One time our trip to Calipatria was detoured because ALL the streets in town were blocked for the festivities. Just east of Brawley is Holtville. The Carrot Festival there each February is something not to be missed. This town with a population of 6,000 puts on a parade of 2+ hours in length, complete with dancing carrots! For the spiritual, Salvation Mountain in Niland is the product of one man's devotion to God. Leonard Knight spent 30 years building it, and while he is gone, his monument remains – quite a sight!
